Worship at 3pm (Traditional) and 7pm (Instrumental Tenebrae) in Woodlake's Sanctuary

Our 7pm worship service will be a contemporary Tenebrae service, "Hope in the Shadows." The Tenebrae service is an ancient Christian Good Friday service that makes use of gradually diminishing light through the extinguishing of candles to symbolize the events of that week from the triumphant Palm Sunday entry through Jesus' burial. This increasing darkness symbolizes the approaching darkness of Jesus' death and of hopelessness in the world without God. The purpose of the service is to recreate the betrayal, abandonment, and agony of the events, and it is left unfinished, because the story isn't over until Easter day. This year, we will work with six instrumentalists including Flute, Oboe, Clarinet, Horn, Cello and Piano.

Notes from Your Leadership Board

What's in a Name (tag)?

I will give you the treasures of darkness and riches hidden in secret places, so that you may know that it is I, the Lord, the God of Israel, who call you by your name. Isaiah 45:3

s a community, it is not only God who calls us by our names. We also want our friends and guests at Woodlake to know us by our names. During February and March, we used name tags with the primary purpose of helping Pr Micah and Linnea get acquainted with the members of Woodlake. We hope they were also helpful for the rest of us who struggle to remember names of the people we see each week. Please let me or any board member know what you think about using name tags in the future.

An internet search found these reasons why name tags are a good idea:

Guest Oriented: People want to be known. We want to give people space to control their experience with our church but we want to meet them when they are ready to connect.

It's an Invitation to talk: Implied in the use of a name tag is an invitation to talk with other people. Our hope is that when people come to church that they connect with the community. The goal is to get people talking to each other!

Memory Aid: You can remember maybe a couple hundred people's names when you see their faces but you can probably remember stuff about several times that many people when given their face and name. The name tag helps you remember a little bit more about people.

It's Not About You: Name tags by definition are about the other people around us, not ourselves. When we put on a name tag we are serving other people who might feel uncomfortable coming up to us.

We are all about building up our community, both inside and outside the walls of our church. There are many ways you can do that at Woodlake. You can be a greeter, welcoming people into church on a Sunday morning. During the sharing of peace in the service, take your time and wish God's peace to as many people as you can. When you are having coffee and treats in the narthex, reach out to someone you may not know very well and strike up a conversation.

We know that as a community, we are stronger when we are together... and we are brought closer together when we share our stories with each other... and we can tell our stories to more people when we call each other by our names.

aster, the day of the Resurrection...What do you think about when the day comes? Do you imagine colored Easter eggs, Easter candy, chocolate rabbits, or colorful marshmallow peeps?

As Christians, we celebrate Easter as one of the biggest occasions and most important holiday of the year. Many people go to Church even if they do not attend church regularly. It is a big celebration.

But, why do we celebrate? What are we celebrating? What are you able to imagine? They might be silly questions. The season makes me think about Jesus' last supper rather than fanfare sound or celebration. The supper was the last time Jesus spent with his disciples. Jesus knew what was going to happen. The betrayal from one of His disciples, Judas: "One of you will betray me," absolute loneliness, humiliation and suffering from the Crucifixion. What will you do when we are at our last moment? I surely say it is love. We are all in search of love and recognition.

I had volunteered at nursing home in Arden Hills every Saturday as a musician with my son for several years. There was an office that we usually check our attendance and get our name tag. There was a board that we could check the list of people who had passed away during the week. I used to check it not because my family were there but it was the last moment of their lives. Because the lives of everyone are important and valuable. There is no one whose life useless.

One day, I found one name was familiar to me. Stephen Paulus! He is one of the most prominent composers of our time. He is my one of favorite composers. He had a special sense to create the delicate musical scene through notes and texts. He was there and I'm pretty sure he listened to our playing even though we didn't recognized him. It was kind of a shock. There was Stephen Paulus. I wished I could go back in time to meet him and say hello and tell him how much I love his music!

The moment...

But if I could go back to the moment that I could meet him, I might miss the moment again. And I am still missing the moment even though I had learned of it through passing of time. This is the reason that I am trying to take the opportunity in the present moment to share something through music with people around me. Music is the tool that I can share something with, through and for others.

Human beings are weak and sinful. But, Jesus came down to us because Jesus loves me and you and your neighbor. We have hope in the darkness because Jesus is a light. He died and has risen for the people around you. That's why we need to keep singing, supporting and loving at this moment.

Jesus replied, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. That is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself. All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." Matthew 22:37-40

This is the time to listen to the commandment. This is the time to follow the commandment. This is the time to act on it.

Building and Finances

Finance: New offering envelopes will soon be mailed out for the six month period beginning May I. Every giving unit currently having an assigned envelope number will be receiving these new envelope packets. Even if you are giving regularly through 'Simply Giving'' you will receive the new envelopes. This way you will have special envelopes for church holidays and special mission entities. Alternatively, you can use the universal giving envelopes that have been placed in the hymnal rack of the pews.

Writing of checks: Just a reminder that if you are giving for one of the special missions, please make your check payable to Woodlake Lutheran Church and designate the recipient (such as VEAP or Global Missions, etc.) in the memo section of your check. The credit union will not allow us to deposit checks in the church account that are made out to someone else. We accumulate the amounts and send a separate check to each individual mission or entity at the end of each month.

Surprise contribution: Last Fall we were quite surprised (and also very pleased) to receive a contribution from a non-member vendor of ours. John Nagengast Doors was so impressed with the church when he was inserting new weather stripping in the front doors that he later sent us a donation of \$300. Not all favorable impressions result in financial gifts to the church but it shows how people can react to a good impression.

Endowment Fund opportunity: The Woodlake Lutheran Church Heritage Endowment Fund Committee is looking for a volunteer to fill a current vacancy on the committee. The commitment would involve attending monthly meetings (currently on the third Wednesday of the month at 1:00 pm), participating in committee policy decisions regarding gifts to the endowment fund, keeping informed on the endowment fund assets and earnings plus reviewing and approving endowment fund distributions at the end of each fiscal year. Helping others: Cleaning and tidying up the church is a constant on-going process that has shown positive rewards. For instance, our older set of communion ware was recently donated to a new start-up church. Also, another new start-up church was happy to take 70 of our older wooden seat folding chairs. This is a positive way to free up unused resources and help new

congregations start out with serviceable assets that we can spare.

Building: By the time you are reading this our Fellowship Hall should have a fresh new look with new flooring, new chairs and newly painted walls. The floors will be easier to clean and the chairs flex a little to provide more comfortable seating. Don't worry, some of the old metal chairs have been saved for special uses such as our summer time outdoor services.

<u>Camperships</u>: We want every child to have the opportunity to experience the fun and joy of summer camp. Campership funding assistance is available from the Endowment Fund. Campership applications are available in the church office and must be received no later than June 15.

Scholarships: High School seniors and current college students (including vocational or trade schools) should be aware that post high school scholarships are also available through the Endowment Fund. Individual amounts depend in part on the number of applicants. Current policy has recently been expanded to include undergraduate studies at any approved college, vocational school or other form of post high school institution. For those students currently attending such a school, they must have completed at least one but not more than three years of undergraduate studies. Scholarship applications are available in the church office and must be received no later than June 15.

Congregational Care Corner

The Congregational Care committee will be having a small piece in the Messenger each month reminding members of caring services at Woodlake. Each month we will remind our members of one of the services that fit under the umbrella of Congregational Care. Woodlake has a number of small group ministries which provide care for our fellow members, their families and friends, and this month, we highlight the Prayer Chain.

There are six units in this building; three units are for the teaching faculty of the seminary and three units are for the workers of community health ministry.
