## Opportunities with Conversations with Friends (CWF)

CWF is an organization interested in supporting people who are being detained by ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) here in Minnesota. Through our group visits in jail classrooms, letter writing, and other programs, volunteers of CWF are in friendship with our brothers and sisters in ICE detention who suffer from isolation, loneliness, uncertainty, and fear as they face deportation and, as a consequence, possible permanent separation from their family, friends and communities. We show that we truly care; they are not alone.

**Upcoming training: Saturday, January 6, 2018, 9 am – 1 pm, in English (location TBD, please inquire when you register).**

Our training is primarily for new letter writers who, once trained, write a weekly letter to a person (usually male) detained by ICE in a Minnesota county jail, until the time the person is released or deported. You might be writing weekly to the same individual for as short as one-two months or as long as six-eight months. We are especially in need of those who can write in Spanish.

- and multiple unrecorded donations to VEAP, Union Gospel Mission and STEP and various winter gear collections.

When I dropped off the Richfield donations the items were hugged by staff and one teacher had tears in her eyes as she has special needs students without winter gear.

## Flooring Update

Hopefully by now you have seen the new carpet installed in the Narthex and main entry area. We are pleased with how well the new carpet blends in with the décor of the Narthex and hope you agree. A date for installation of the LVT (luxury vinyl tile) in the Fellowship Hall has been delayed due to excessive moisture test readings in the concrete floor. We are looking into various ways of addressing this problem and hope to have a resolution soon. Whether reducing the moisture level or better sealing of the surface, some additional cost will likely be incurred. We are also concentrating on other flooring issues in hallways where moisture in the concrete slab is also a problem, but not quite as severe.

All the schools ask if we have mittens. If anyone want to make or buy mittens we will get them to the social workers at the schools.

Though we get a grant for yarn from the endowment fund our need- the children's need- outpaces the money available. You are welcome to donate money or yarn as well. We have decided to focus on children at this time because they have little choice in the lot they are given. The schools are not wanting scarves as much because they are hard for some children to handle and present a choking hazard on playgrounds and buses and in some neighborhoods bullies catch kids by the scarves as well. We give the items to the school nurse or social worker to give out to ensure that they go to people who really need them.
